Recently Lenyce, Julie and I were invited to a conference called Towards Jerusalem Council II. The purpose of this meeting was to connect as Gentile Christians with Messianic Jews and to work towards the fulfillment of the one new man concept of *Ephesians 2*.

As Christians we are called to be ministers of reconciliation. As *St Paul* says:

"All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation." 2 Cor 5:18, 19

In the Holy Spirit, we endeavour to bring this reconciliation to marriages, families, between people, amongst all Christian denominations, and between Jews and Christians.

Towards Jerusalem Council II is about starting the process of reconciliation between Messianic Jews and Christians. The vision of TJCII states "consistent with the principle established in the original Jerusalem Council of Acts

Chapter 15 regarding respect for diversity in the Body of Christ concerning Jewish and Gentile identity... finally, we affirm that as Jewish and Gentile expressions of life in Jesus grow organically side by side with distinct identities that God will be glorified; that the Kingdom of Heaven will be advanced and that the vision of "the one new man" in Ephesians 2 will unfold as part of the original Abrahamic blessing to the nations." 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### **ACROSS MY DESK**

One of the most intriguing communications to come across my desk in recent times was the invitation to attend the Towards Jerusalem Council II Consultation in Singapore. I did not know very much about this work of the

Holy Spirit and was thrilled to find 27 Nations represented from across the world, and especially from the Pacific and Torres Strait Islands, our neighbours. I found the discussions very enlightening and discovered just how much I needed to learn about this work of unity in which the Holy Spirit is drawing us to participate. TJCII is an initiative of repentance and reconciliation between the Jewish and Gentile segments of the church. God is putting people into place – not to evangelise necessarily but to disciple when the harvest comes.

Speaking personally, I found these days bringing me an excitement about the way the Holy Spirit is drawing us all back to a place of unity. Praising God and praying together was a powerful time and brought again the awareness of the holiness of God when there is a common purpose to honour God. It reminds me of the word at the beginning of the prayer Jesus taught us: 'our'. Beginning the prayer of Jesus with the word 'our' shifts the emphasis from individuals onto the Father of all, and to our brothers and sisters that form God's family. Being in unity brings a blessing from the Lord according to the Psalmist.

How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity! It is like precious oil poured on the head, running down on the beard, running down on Aaron's beard, down on the collar of his robe. It is as if the dew of Hermon were falling on Mount Zion.

For there the LORD bestows his blessing, even life forevermore.

Psalm 133

What a blessing and unifying factor is prayer. When we pray together we are focusing on the God who loves all his children and his love encircles each person to rest comfortably in his will. It is hard to enter God's plan unless we are prepared to sacrifice self-interest and embrace the 'our'.

It is unfortunate that many see this in a fearful way as if it is directing us to be all the same. It is not about being the same but about respecting each other as the beloved children of God and working together to bring God's kingdom to our earth. This is accomplished more by obedience to the words of Jesus – 'love one another' than it ever will be by theological arguments.

As St Paul reminded the Corinthains:

Just as the human body is one, though it has many parts that together form one body, so too is Christ. For by one Spirit we all were immersed and mingled into one single body. And no matter our status—whether we are Jews or non-Jews, oppressed or free—we are all privileged to drink deeply of the same Holy Spirit. (1 Cor 12: 12-27) Passion trans.

As we move into the season of Advent and the beautiful Christmas liturgy celebrating the birth of Jesus we ought to remember to pray for his whole body (which includes our family and friends) and pray as Jesus did: watch over them so that they will be united as one, even as we are one.

This has already been acknowledged and encouraged in the Catechism of the Catholic Church which states:


"The glorious Messiah's coming is suspended at every moment of history until his recognition by "all Israel", for "a hardening has come upon part of Israel" in their "unbelief" toward Jesus. St. Peter says to the Jews of Jerusalem after Pentecost: "Repent therefore, and turn again, that your sins may be blotted out, that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord, and that he may send the Christ appointed for you, Jesus, whom heaven must receive until the time for establishing all that God spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old." St. Paul echoes him: "For if their rejection means the reconciliation of the world, what will their acceptance mean but life from the dead?" The "full inclusion" of the Jews in the Messiah's salvation, in the wake of "the full number of the Gentiles", will enable the People of God to achieve "the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ", in which "God may be all in all." (CCC674).

This was also a desire of Pope John XXIII. He issued a document - *Nostra Aetate* – towards the end of Vatican Council II. This document, which he suggested to be read in the light of the other 15 documents of Vatican II, especially Lumen Gentium, teaches that "the church is, like a sacrament, or as a sign and instrument... of the unity of the whole human race", with whom we share the pilgrim journey of life." It includes an account of the spiritual ties between Christians and Jews, which reproves indiscriminate accusations of Jewish responsibility for the death of Jesus; affirms the ongoing validity of the Covenant between God and the people of Israel; and repudiates hatred, persecution and anti-Semitism as contrary to God's universal love. Pope John XXIII's legacy has been continued through subsequent popes up till our present Pope Francis. This is in keeping with the prayer of Jesus, just before he was arrested:

"Sanctify them in the truth; Your Word is truth. As you have sent Me into the world, so I have sent them into the world... ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in Me through their word, that they may all be one." (John 17:17, 20-21).

The key word in Towards Jerusalem Council II is TOWARDS. We are beginning a process of reconciliation which may take time to be fully realised. Hopefully this sharing may help us on our journey of reconciliation.

# "Seek eagerly the gifts"

In May of this year I attended the National Service Committee meeting in Brisbane, along with the other state representatives of Charismatic Renewal in Australia.

Now I'm your typical 'bloke' when it comes to fashion – I packed my bag by throwing in a couple of pairs of trouser, enough socks and undies to last the weekend, and the next 5 shirts off the pile!

We started our meeting on the Friday night with a long praise time, (as you might expect when Charismatics come together). During the praise time a prophetic word came forth and it went something like this: "I see someone packing their suitcase for this meeting and they have packed all red shirts, and the red is symbolic of the blood that I shed for you on the cross; ... and I am giving to this person a deeper love for me and a deeper awareness of My passion which was expressed in the shedding of my blood for you."

To be honest I didn't associate myself with this prophetic vision because I knew that I hadn't packed my shirts with any consideration as to their colour, style or what they might signify! The praise continued and we had a great night of prayerful preparation for the weekend meeting that lay ahead of us.

The following morning, showered and ready to dress, I went to my bag to grab out a shirt – and behold, the look on my face when I noticed that all the shirts I had packed were red or burgundy in colour! My heart started to race as I immediately recalled last night's prophetic word – could Jesus really have been speaking about me?! The prophecy was so specific that I had no hesitation in accepting that this was truly a word from the Lord, it truly was intended for me and I needed to be 'open' to the fulfillment of this word in my life!

Back in Perth and 5 months on, I have seen this prophetic word unfolding. My love for Him has grown as the 'busyness' of the year continues to make demands on my time, talents and treasures, and through my response to those demands my love for the Lord grows deeper!

This brings me to the point of my article, the importance of the prophetic gifts! Now let me say from the start that all the spiritual gifts are important, but St Paul draws special attention to the gift of Prophecy in 1 Cor 14:1, "Pursue love, but strive eagerly for the spiritual gifts, above all that you may prophesy" (RNAB).

The 'Prophetic Word' gift is especially important to me because it was through this gift that I was drawn to God, 40 years ago! As a young man I was working temporarily out of Perth, in the mining town of Kalgoorlie, and staying with family for the duration. While there, a Charismatic Prayer meeting was held in the house and I was warned that, "a prayer meeting was going to be held this evening and I was welcome to join in or watch TV in the lounge while the meeting took place in another room" - I chose the TV! When the meeting started, I couldn't help but notice that it seemed 'awfully loud for a prayer meeting!' I asked about it the following day and the charismatic nature of the prayer meeting was explained to me which totally surprised me because, although I had heard of spiritual gifts from the bible I was shocked to hear that such gifts were still in use today!

I returned to Perth at the end of my stint in Kal and a couple of months later moved into a new house in Gosnells. I approached the parish priest, Fr Tom Prendiville, to ask him if he knew anything of these 'charismatic prayer meetings' to which he replied, "yes, we have one in this parish!". I vowed to attend and, full of courage (or ignorance!) I went along to the meeting.

It took less than 5 minutes before I asked myself, "what am I doing among these crazy people!?... they were praying aloud with fervour, calling out 'phrases of devotion and love' which surely should be kept in the privacy of one's own mind!... talking to Jesus as if He was really there! (more than once I looked over my shoulder just to make sure He wasn't! Honestly, I couldn't wait to escape, and I surely would have if I wasn't so timid and the door wasn't so far away! As the evening drew to a close the leader of the group asked' "who needs prayer?" ...and well-intended members immediately pushed me into the centre of the group proclaiming, "Dan does!"

If everything before had terrified me, it was nothing compared to the shock of being 'man-handled' into the centre where all these weird people started praying over me and calling on God to "touch my life with blessings!" (or something like that!)... but that's when the Spirit showed up for me! The leader spoke out a prophetic vision claiming it was "God's word to me, right now!" I didn't know this man; I had never met him before, but the words he spoke touched on my life story and moved me in a way that I knew God had spoken! It couldn't be just this man because he didn't know those intimate details of my life! I left the meeting that night perplexed at what had happened, but not intrigued enough to want to return!

Next week, something happened to 'push' me into going to the meeting again, and again I felt totally uncomfortable among these weirdos, but again they prayed over me and again the prophetic word cut me to the heart!

In short, I continued to attend, each week being pushed by some irresistible force, and it took many months before I could say I was comfortable with the charismatic spirituality. God used the prophetic word gift to draw me to Him and, had I not experienced Him through prophecy, I would never have returned for a second night!

Sadly, many people never return for a second night. God is often unsuccessful in 'wooing' His beloved to come to Him. We are created in diversity and thus God speaks to us in ways that suit our uniqueness, and for me God spoke, and continues to speak, through the gift of prophecy. I know He speaks through many avenues including prayer, scripture, church, friends etc, but I often hear Him most clearly through the prophetic word.

Having led a prayer meeting for many years, I know the struggles that exist concerning the use of the spiritual gifts. It's challenging for people to step out in faith and use the gift; it's frustrating for leaders trying to encourage people to step out; it's burdensome for members trying to discern if the gift is authentic or coming from our humanity! ... and then there are those who use the gift once or twice and then stop using it, perhaps because they succumb to fear, perhaps because of someone's negative comment and occasionally because they feel they've 'done their bit' and they can relax and let someone else have a go!

Individually, we witness our faith (either deliberately or accidentally) to those around us, and that includes our

fellow prayer group members. Therefore, it is so important that we persevere in using our giftedness for the uplifting of the body and be not distracted from this calling by our enemy, Satan, who finds many opportunities to dissuade us in serving the Lord (Heb 12:1). Our excuses for not using the gifts can make perfect sense to our humanity, but it is God Himself who gave us these gifts with the expressed desire that we should use them!

Many charismatic groups have faded away because they stopped using the gifts! There can be many excuses put forward but, so often, it's really just that people have not persevered in exercising their faith in the assembly - I wonder how many people have not heard God's word for them because you or I didn't use the giftedness we've been given; how many have not grown in their giftedness because you or I refused to persevere in using our own gifts!? It's easier to take a 'back seat' role and let the experts 'handle it'!... it's more comfortable to just listen than to speak up!... then there's the nagging drone in your ears telling you, "you don't really have any gifts; ...what if you're mistaken;... why would God choose you, amongst all these 'holier people'?" I wonder where those thoughts come from??

We are the "Catholic Charismatic Renewal"! Our name directly refers to the charismatic gifts which were made evident on that fateful weekend at Duquesne in February 1967. If we are called to this ministry, we are called to use our spiritual giftedness in accordance with our abilities, and in obedience to the appointed leadership of the Renewal. We don't have to wonder whether we should be using spiritual gifts - it's automatically a part of the calling that God has placed on the Renewal, and on you and me personally. And why is it so important to use these gifts?... because Jesus, Himself, preached the Gospel with miracles accompanying His word! He didn't expect people to believe Him because he spoke, but to believe because he proved that He was sent from God through the miracles that He worked! (see Jn 14: 10, 11). Neither will you and I win souls to the kingdom through our 'clever conversation'! It will be through the manifestation of the Spirit, the 'signs and wonders' that accompany our words and example – these will bear the fruit that brings people to Jesus.

I strongly urge all members of the Renewal to persevere in using your own gifts, in encouraging others to use their gifts and to be aware that through our perseverance we give good witness to others. Who knows?? Maybe your example will inspire the next young man to give his life to Christ through the priesthood and become a future Pope of the Church!

There are many stages in our spiritual journey and one clear stage for me was the night someone dared to speak a prophetic word over me! It changed my life and I've never looked back! If he had not had the courage to speak out, I may never have been here today sharing with you the privilege and joy of knowing Jesus as my Lord and Saviour.

# **CCR:** A FUTURE?

It is the moment to go ahead with greater strength, leaving behind the dust of time that we have allowed to accumulate, being thankful for what we have received and facing the new with trust in the action of the Holy Spirit!"

-Pope Francis, Pentecost 2017, CCR Jubilee, Rome.

The Co-ordinators for Catholic Charismatic Renewal Melbourne meet regularly to pray together and to seek the Father's heart for what he desires – bringing all our 'doings' to him and seeking guidance on where we are going. Lately I am asked 'what is the future for CCR now that we have CHARIS - as if there was no future!

One of the Scriptures that has been placed on our hearts time and again is "Enlarge the place of your tent, stretch your tent curtains wide, do not hold back, lengthen your cords, strengthen your stakes. For you will spread out to the right and to the left." (Isaiah 54:2-3)

Like Pope Francis' words, this scripture invites us to shout out, think big, don't hold back, secure your foundations and go deeper. It suggests there will be tension – but recognise where it will come from and develop trust in the Lord to deal with it. Expand your vision, look at the big picture, be bold and full of courage. Now is the time to strengthen our stakes to be part of the mission of the Holy Spirit. Our Church needs us to be faithful to our specific calling: to faithfully share the grace of baptism in the Holy Spirit and use the gifts we have been given to benefit the Church and the world. This has been reinforced many times by Pope Francis when speaking to the Renewal, and the launch of CHARIS reinforces this mission as mandate. God's Word invites us to 'strengthen our stakes' – to widen them to include new people and new ways of doing things.

These are CCR's important 'stakes' which need strengthening if we are to move forward with greater strength; they are spoken of prophetically at every Conference I have attended in the past twenty years and have been printed in nearly every publication over the same period. I believe it is time for us all to take this prophetic word to heart and put it into action.

- **1. A return to praise –** Praise is a gift of our heart to God's heart. It is a gift that the Holy Spirit has bestowed upon CCR in a particular way. When we are faithful, it is our gift to the whole Church. It is our duty and privilege to spend time in praise, individually, and in our groups and communities. Wholehearted praise is a celebration of God and his goodness.
- **2.** Use of the gifts we need to create space to use the gifts of the Holy Spirit in praise and worship, especially the gifts of tongues and prophecy. It was the signs and wonders that accompanied Jesus in his ministry.
- **3. Scripture –** Pope Francis has called charismatics to return to our first love of the Word and to carry the Word with us wherever we go. We must be formed, first and

foremost, by the Word of God, which has the power to transform us and our world. The year 2020 has been declared the year of the Word of God and Pope Francis has nominated the Third Sunday in January as the Sunday on which to celebrate and proclaim the Word of God in greater zeal.

- **4.** Recognising giftedness in others and being willing to bring our gift. If we are used to letting others get on with it, it's time to bring our gift. If we are used to doing everything, it's time to encourage others to bring their gifts.
- **5. Unity** The Lord is calling us to a new depth of unity with each other- within CCR, intergenerationally and with other churches. Sometimes there has been unhealthy competition or rivalry between groups, ministries or communities in CCR. We need to be humble and seek healing and unity, working together for our mission. Intergenerationally, we need to see the gifts each generation brings and be open to new ways of doing things.

Of course, the very heart of CCR is ecumenical; the grace of baptism in the Spirit is a current of grace we share with many other churches. This needs to be reflected in our relationships and mission.

- **6. Reclaiming our hope –** It is easy to become disillusioned and lose hope in God's promises. Some of us need to receive healing from God in order to walk again in the hope, love and power of the Holy Spirit.
- 7. Expectant faith Again, it is easy to believe the miracles and wonders of CCR's early days no longer happen. I really believe, as we use our gifts for mission, we will see God act in amazing ways in the coming years. People will come to faith, and lives will be transformed. We need to be expectant that He will act.

#### Pope Francis wants us to impact the whole church

I invite you to reflect on these 'stakes' as we move through the season of Advent. I believe we will see a new level of fruitfulness in CCR, which will impact the whole Church.

As we strengthen our stakes - our key commitments and priorities – and as we stretch out our tent, we will see God move and many people come to know Him.

Go forward, believe in the future and don't look back – in fact run with all that is within you: God will be running with you.

It was an historical moment in the life of the Renewal as CHARIS was launched. 

What struck me most profoundly about the CHARIS Conference was the renewed emphasis on the Ecumenical aspect of the Charismatic Renewal. In his address Cardinal Farrell made the following statement," ...Pope Francis identified Catholic Charismatic Renewal as an instrument of choice for the Church's ecumenical effort. It is a sign of providence that the Pentecost experience has emerged in all churches and Ecclesial Communities. There is therefore a shared spiritual experience across Charismatic Renewal for Christians of all denominations." A significant part of the CHARIS mandate is Ecumenism. The Pope had previously given the Renewal a mandate to take the baptism of the Holy Spirit to the whole church, but this was for me a refreshing new mandate for CHARIS. The Holy Spirit has been poured out on every denomination regardless of theological correct-ness. A personal Pentecost is available to anyone who is thirsty without reference to their theological persuasion. Only the Holy Spirit could break down denominational walls and barriers in such an extraordinary and creative way.

An article in the Franciscan media shares: "Christmas is a holy time that invites you to reflect on the most important issues in life, especially escaping the darkness of ignorance and arriving at the light of new understanding and possibility. It ritualizes the birth of your soul. Remember that ritual is an ordinary action carried out with special attention to its poetics that has far greater significance than would appear. If you take Christmas to heart and get past the anxieties in arranging for gifts and parties, you will rediscover yourself every year at this time and experience a birth in yourself, just like the one so beautifully described in the Gospel stories. It will be a celebration of both the birth of Jesus and the birth of your own soul."

As the spirit of Christmas is in giving, not getting, we reach out in love to those who need it most. It does not have to be a material gift, although for some members of our community a present can sparkle their life. Spending time with a lonely friend, relative or family member and sometimes even a stranger, is a treasured offering. Reconciling and forgiving, the heart softening is a blessed act. Remembering the birth of Christ puts us into a position of humility and obedience. Attending church services connects us to people of faith and hope


and we can sing together of the night being holy and calm. Honouring deceased loved ones we have lost during the season will help us overcome the grief and sadness for missing them on such a special time.

One spiritual writer said that what you bring to Christmas is the window of your soul. It is a great time to examine if your Christmas illuminates your soul or darkens it.

Jesus is the true spirit of Christmas. Without Him, there is only materialism, self-absorption, greed and tokenism. But with Him at the centre, there is a world of joy, peace, hope, love, compassion, friendship, service. It is hard to give of one's full self like Jesus did, but it is not impossible to share some wonderful part of ourselves.

If we can look at Christmas as a spiritual journey to Bethlehem, the days we will travel towards it will take on new meaning and might stir our soul to rejoice again.

# LIFE IN THE SPIRIT SEMINARS AND YOUNG PEOPLE

Maureen Clarke shares her experience of helping primary school children find faith in Jesus through Life in the Spirit seminars.

I ask all of you that... you organise Life in the Spirit seminars in your parishes and schools to share Baptism in the Spirit. (Pope Francis, 2015)

Perhaps, as the new school year starts, you would like to consider giving your children the opportunity to open wide their hearts to the life-changing power and love of the Holy Spirit. We tend to think that "Life in the Spirit Seminars" are for adults, but many children have so far experienced the transformative power through the 'Life in the Spirit Seminars' written specially for them.

#### Faith comes alive in Inner-City Manchester

At an inner-city school in Manchester where I taught for many years, children from Key Stage 2 came together last thing on a Friday afternoon to praise and worship the

Lord through lively singing and dancing. Readings adapted to the childrens' agerange and a period of silent meditation were also used.

Our school chaplain, Fr. Pat Deegan, regularly came into school to praise the Lord with us. Fr. Pat then asked me to write "Life in the Spirit Seminars" for the children. Fr. Pat was delighted with the content and delivery of the Seminars, along with the children's response to the five-week course.

He then suggested it should be filmed, so that it could be shared with other schools and churches. The film includes the five talks, the children praising the Lord in song and contributing to the delivery of the talks. It is all child friendly.

The talks lead up to the children being prayed with for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit on week 4. Without fail, every time the Seminars have been delivered, week 4 has been so very moving.

#### The Holy Spirit takes over

Each time I have delivered the Seminars, I have been aware of the power of the Holy Spirit taking over and working in our children. Even children with a few problems seem to become calm and engrossed in the sessions.

The seminars can be delivered to up to 100 children, or to an individual class/group.

To deliver these Seminars, everything you need is on the DVD. A song sheet is provided so your children can join with

the children on the DVD in praising the Lord. Week 4 demonstrates how to organise praying with the children and their parents, if they so wish.





We read in scripture that many who heard Jesus speak of eating His flesh and drinking His blood, left Him. John 6:54-55 "So Jesus said to them, 'Truly, truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh and drink the blood of the Son of

Man, you have no life in you. Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day. For My flesh is real food, and My blood is real drink" (NIV). Whilst recollecting my thoughts and bringing them captive to the Lord I can receive Him in a manner which is much more worthy. I imagine His flesh becoming part of my flesh. His blood mixing with my blood. I envisage Him healing me. Then the Holy Spirit quietens my spirit so that I can remain focused on this wonderful mystery of the Body and Blood of Christ living in me and calming me.

Advent will shortly be upon us. A time of preparation for the coming of the Child Jesus into our hearts. But Jesus comes to us each time we receive Him in Communion. As we focus our thoughts on Him then He is that Infant Child that comes at Christmas. He's the 12 year old preaching in the Temple. The Jesus crowned with thorns, scourged at the pillar or the Crucified One. Then He is the Resurrected One. Thus, we share in His life's story and join ours to His.

May the Infant Jesus bless you and your families this Christmas with the fullness of His being and His love. For Jesus said in John 14:23 "Anyone, who loves me will obey my teaching (including the teaching of eating His flesh and drinking His blood). My Father will love them, and we (Father and Son) will come to them and make our home in them." So, it makes sense to let Jesus be the Centre of our lives and our Christmas celebrations through frequent reception of Holy Communion!
